


Olga J. Sterling-Rossiter Small Business sales manager | Joined 2018

Who was Daniel R. Butler?

Dan joined CSC in 1976, was president and CEO through 1998, and eventually served as chair of the board. He was instrumental in building a culture of treating people well—both within the walls of CSC and beyond. He built a reputation not only as a business leader who was genuine, but also as a community friend and supporter. He was known and loved for his ability to connect with others, regardless of their situation and status, and went out of his way to make people feel valued. Dan made a difference in so many lives. For those who were lucky enough to know him, he left an indelible impression and is remembered for his glowing presence and kindness. Dan built the foundation upon which CSC stands today.



Charity Spotlight

Local Charities Get Love from Their Volunteers

The people of CSC have donated their time and money to more than 200 charities in the last 12 months. Each of those organizations holds a special place in the hearts of so many in their local communities. Among them are the Ronald McDonald House and LauraLynn, Ireland's Children's Hospice.

Ronald McDonald House (RMH) Charities

RMH provides a safe, affordable home away from home for families of seriously or chronically ill or injured children being treated at hospitals around the world. There are more than 380 Ronald McDonald Houses currently operating in 64 countries.

CSC colleagues donate their time and money to a variety of events to benefit RMH, including 5K races, cooking dinner and preparing meals for patients' families, holiday celebrations, and so much more. Our colleagues also purchase wish list items and serve on the boards of directors of local RMH chapters.

"My daughter was born prematurely and was treated in the neonatal intensive care unit, so we visited the RMH Family Room often," says Katie Patterson, a global subsidiary coordinator. "I knew then that I wanted to get involved. I'm grateful to CSC for inspiring me to get started and for encouraging my ongoing efforts."

LauraLynn, Ireland's Children's Hospice

Nearly 40 colleagues from the Dublin and Gorey offices in Ireland were on the move last May to help LauraLynn, Ireland's Children's Hospice. The participants were each challenged to walk 100 kilometers (62 miles) during May and raise 1,000 euros for the hospice.

They formed eight teams of five walkers, which made the project fun and pressure-free for everyone. "Every level of the company was working on this effort; everyone took part and donated, from senior management down," says Global Financial Markets manager Maria Alexiuc. "It was a good way to come together." By the end of May, the teams covered 7,199 kilometers (4,473 miles) and raised 1,555 euros. "The fact that we donated to a charity that supports children with cancer and sometimes makes last wishes come true for children—it's amazing to be able to do that," says Maria.

CSC gave the team an additional 1,000 euros to donate to LauraLynn, which inspired the group to start planning their next charity project. Ian Garvan, Global Capital Markets (GCM) director, suggested an intercompany football tournament, and the office quickly fielded a team of eight. The football fundraiser was also a team-building opportunity. GCM Senior Manager David Flynn says they're looking to do even more charitable work.

GERT HUIZING

The way Gert Huizing sees it, sharing and giving back are the nicest things you can do.

Through coaching or helping someone to take a hurdle in life more easily, Gert realizes it's easy to create an impact simply by sharing your experience. "One small star can light up the universe, so be the spark that lights up a small star," the senior internal auditor says.

Gert's coaching experience led him to the board of the Intertrust Foundation, which has joined with CSC Gives Back to broaden the company's philanthropic reach around the world. He was asked to join the board after coaching and inspiring a team of trainees with their social responsibility project.

Since then, he's been involved with Workplace Pride, which led to the signing of the Declaration of Amsterdam. This document calls for, among other things, LGBTQ-inclusive workplaces in the city. At the office, Gert says he tries to help stimulate an inclusive workplace by organizing local Pride-related activities. He's organized a Pride drinks get-together and a visit to an LGBTQ home for the elderly, where residents received Pride-themed cupcakes.

He's also a mentor for Workplace Pride, supporting young LGBTQ professionals and sharing his experiences, like coming out in the workplace. "I try to be an LGBTQ role model for my colleagues," he says, adding that he volunteers at the annual Workplace Pride conference in Amsterdam.

Gert also gives back on his own. In September, he swam two kilometers through the historic canals of Amsterdam in the Amsterdam City Swim to raise funds for the Dutch ALS Foundation. He's raised more than 7,000 euros in the seven times he's participated in the event.

Giving back has always held a special place in Gert's heart, and he feels obligated to help those who didn't have the same opportunities he was fortunate enough to have. Whether it's supporting young LGBTQ colleagues or swimming the canals of Amsterdam, Gert always finds a way to give back to those around him.

FLORA EKRA

If there's a project involving giving back to the community in Luxembourg, chances are Flora Ekra has a hand in it.

Flora, head of client hospitality and internal events, took over the charitable events portion of the job when she assumed responsibility for internal events. "When the local management team asked me to organize some fundraising events, I checked the archives to see what had been done and if there was something I could add to my to-do list," she explains.

She discovered the Luxembourg office had a long-standing relationship with SOS Children's Village, a worldwide charity that ensures that children and young people who have no parental care or are at risk of losing it grow up with the bonds they need to become their strongest selves. Flora contacted the group's local office and reinitiated the relationship.

"It started with bake sales," she says. "I invited colleagues to bring some cakes to the office that we'd sell. All the funds we raised were put into a donation box at the office. We ended up raising a little more than 600 euros by the end of the year."

Pleased with the outcome, Flora looked to do more. She heard the office was getting new computer screens for everyone and giving away the old ones to any colleague who wanted one. "We combined the screen giveaway with a donation program by asking people who were taking used screens to donate something for charity."

She says colleagues told their kids about the giveaway and asked if they'd like to donate in exchange for used screens. "We had several kids who gave us money to get some screens. I thought it was a nice story because not only was it arranged by colleagues for colleagues, but they involved their own kids. The kids got an early start learning about giving back."

Another tech donation was spurred by an office move. Before moving into their new digs, colleagues in Luxembourg took part in a decluttering process. While tidying up, they discovered some Chromebook computers that were no longer in use. "I asked if I could look into possibilities of donating them instead of just giving them away," Flora says. She learned about Digital Inclusion, which works to improve access to technology in Luxembourg for senior citizens, teens, job seekers, and immigrants, among others. Digital Inclusion was happy to receive 58 Chromebooks to give to people in need.

The Luxembourg office is also involved in Relay for Life, which helps cancer patients and their families through Fondation Cancer. The relay involves teams of 24 to 48 people taking turns running or walking for 24 hours at one of the biggest sports centers in the country every March. "Our team took turns running or walking for 30 minutes at a time," Flora says, adding that the team will be back for the 2024 event.

Think Pink Luxembourg, a breast cancer charity, also got a boost from the office. Flora reached out and said that, instead of the usual fundraising happy hour, her colleagues wanted to do something for Pinktober. The event allows people to run or walk, with no set distance, with registration fees going to people and families affected by breast cancer.

The desire to give back to the community is strong in Luxembourg, and Flora is always looking for ways the office can lend a hand. Another decluttering is planned before the move, and she's confident there are more treasures in the building that could help people and families in need.

Some may think volunteering can be a huge time commitment, but the way Stacy Tyson sees it, everyone should try to make an impact. "We have a shared responsibility to our neighbors, children, and communities to effect the changes that we want to see," she says.

Stacy, a technology manager who's been with CSC for more than 16 years, is a triple threat when it comes to giving back. She volunteers for Junior Achievement (JA) of Delaware, Supportive Transitional and Emergency Housing Ministry (STEHM), and the Mary Campbell Center (MCC).

JA works with young people to enable them to own their economic and academic success with a focus on work readiness, entrepreneurship, and financial literacy. Before getting involved with the organization more than 10 years ago, Stacy imagined how great it would feel to contribute, but didn't really comprehend the effect it would have on her until after her first event. "I was blown away—I felt like I may have gotten more out of the event than the students," she says. "More than 10 years later, this still holds true. I was in awe of the incredible minds, ideas, and grit I witnessed throughout the event."

Stacy says there is no greater contribution we can make than to empower, inspire, and prepare young people to succeed. "Teaching financial literacy, career readiness, entrepreneurship, and how the real world works gives students a leg up. It allows them to find what they're passionate about and continue to work toward their goals," she says. "I've never left a JA event not feeling inspired." In addition to volunteering at various JA events, Stacy is a member of the organization's young professionals board, where she's financial chair. She also organizes job shadowing programs, where between 10 and 40 JA students visit CSC Headquarters twice a year to learn about different positions within the business.

Stacy also works closely with STEHM, an organization that provides long-term transitional housing for women and children. As a board member, her focus is on identifying opportunities to engage the community, grant writing, and social media and website management. "The work is incredibly rewarding, but also highlights a great need within our community for affordable independent housing options," she says. Part of STEHM's mission is to help people achieve the goal of living independently through counseling and life skills training in a safe, supportive environment.

Stacy also makes time for MCC, which serves people with physical, intellectual, or developmental disabilities. She works with residents on arts and crafts projects and seasonal celebrations. The residents at MCC are some of the most tenacious people Stacy says she's ever had the pleasure to know. "They overcome seemingly insurmountable obstacles with kindness, humor, and grace," she says. "MCC holds a special place in my heart, as I've always brought my daughter—who was a year old when we first started—with me to volunteer. She has formed some beautiful friendships that have taught her lessons she would not able to learn from a book."

Stacy says a common theme with JA, STEHM, and MCC is their drive to improve peoples' lives and the neighborhoods in Wilmington. "I consider myself lucky that one of my personal core values so closely aligns with a CSC Core Value. I'd encourage everyone to find an opportunity to leverage a personal passion in a philanthropic way."

Seretha Gaudet just can't say no to a good cause.

Whether it's cleaning up and socializing with kittens that are up for adoption, fostering a dog in search of a forever home, or being asked to help with the community theater, this talent development partner in Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, Canada, is there to help.

"When I was growing up, my parents always helped others. We weren't rich but what we had, we shared," she recalls. "When road crews would work on the road in front of my house, my mom would bring them treats and cold drinks. My dad had an elder aunt, and every fall we'd bring her a big box of food and preserves. These acts of kindness resonated with me, and today I try to do the same in all that I do. This is my tribute to their life of service." Recently, she's volunteered for J&M Foster for Cats Society, Furever Homes Dog Rescue, Yarmouth Arts and Recreation Center, and Acts of Kindness (AOK) Nova Scotia.

Sometimes all it takes is a photo or a small request to get Seretha involved. "A friend asked me to help with a play," she says, reflecting on how she first became involved with the Yarmouth Arts and Recreation Center. Twenty years later, she's still involved, now volunteering as a stage manager. Other colleagues from the office also volunteer there, including Holly Throp, Mandy Hubley, Tanya Cormier, Nick Nickerson, and Gerald Cormier.

A social media post asking for help led her to AOK, where she's volunteered extensively for the last three years. Seretha has worked on a house for a family in need and made and delivered meals for the group's soup kitchen. "When I was serving at the soup kitchen, a man named George, who was probably close to 90 years old, took my hands and looked in my eyes and said, "Thank you for what you're doing," she recalls. "The joy you feel when you help others can't be compared to any other."

She helps out in the community because of her firm belief that it's the right thing to do. "I'd like to think I've done all I could to help others, whether they be human or animal," she says. She supports animal well-being organizations as well, helping to clean up at foster buildings, socializing kittens, doing reference checks for potential adopters, and more. She often teams up with colleagues to help magnify their impact. And volunteerism runs strong throughout the Yarmouth office. Some, like client service partner Amy Frotten, get involved with organizations focused on filling gaps within the community that affect young people, including mental health support and housing. Others focus on the arts.

For Seretha, the details around where and how you get involved aren't too important. "Whether you're serving meals at a soup kitchen or helping at a shelter, you can find joy in all these actions. It doesn't have to be a grand gesture—a simple smile for a stranger can be all the service they need. You don't know what others' trials may be, but a kind word can help," she says.

"People often comment on how busy I am—I volunteer, I'm a mom and a wife, and I work twoand-a-half jobs—and the truth is, I love it. I love people, that's the secret. I love helping others succeed and finding a way to ensure that every interaction I have with people leaves them a little bit lighter of heart. This is how I serve. I help where I can and am truly blessed to have others that follow that same path with me."

BANGALORE, INDIA OFFICE



The path of giving back frequently intersects with the path of diversity and belonging. For many, helping others means more when they can give that help to those who are part of a marginalized community. That's one reason why colleagues in the Bangalore, India, office teamed up to give back to hearing-impaired and visually impaired children.

Following a successful in-office event, where a sign language instructor visited and taught the sign language alphabet and basic phrases, our colleagues were eager to put their new knowledge to use. "We wanted to create awareness around the International Day of Sign Language (Sept. 24) and to give back to our community in an inclusive way. After the event, we engaged with CSC Gives Back to help hearing-impaired children," explains Disha Dugar Jhunjhunwala, an assistant vice president in Bangalore.

Colleagues started their efforts with a collection drive. They gathered three cartons of clothes and shoes that were later donated, and brought the materials to Oceanik College, which has programs for hearing- and visually impaired children. Several of them also stayed for a visit with the kids. "The kids were thrilled we were visiting. They painted their faces white and did a mime performance for us," Disha says. "We only planned to stay an hour or two because the school is so far from the office, but we ended up spending the whole day with them. They were so excited to see us."

They worked with a translator while they were there to help them communicate with the children. The kids even shared their plans for future careers. "Some wanted to work at banks, others wanted to write, and one wanted to coach a cricket team. They told us they want to learn life skills and computer skills," Disha says.

During their visit, the India team learned that the program is self-funded and was looking for additional financial assistance. The team saw that as another opportunity to make a difference. "They didn't have enough tables and chairs for all 100 students in their eating area, and we wanted to help," Disha explains. "We talked to Colleen Mulligan (CSC Gives Back program manager) and got the discussion to the India offices CSC Committee, which arranged for funds to be sent to the school for the tables and chairs."

Toward the end of their visit, the children presented the team with two handmade cards as a thank-you for spending the day with them. "That was really touching," says Disha. "It was one of the best workdays I've ever had." The group returned home, ready to find new ways to have an impact, dedicated to making their communities kinder and more inclusive.
